During the summer of 1965, three students of Dawson-Bryant High School and two students of South Point High School, members of the All Ohio Youth Choir, will tour Europe. They will be among 124 other Ohio Youth Choir members accorded this honor.

The State Fair Youth Choir performed for thousands of Ohio State Fair-goers in Columbus this summer. One of their most avid fans was Governor James A. Rhodes, who attended nearly every performance of the choir.

The Dawson-Bryant High School students, Linda Maggard, Barry Hixon and Betty Barker, and the South Point students, Carole Freeman and Lois Eaton, are planning to make the trip as members of the All Ohio Youth Choir after being a part of the State Fair Youth Choir this summer.

These 124 fortunate students, representing the State of Ohio, and Lawrence County, in eleven European countries for three glorious weeks, starting July 15,

will be directed on the tour by Mr. Glenville Thomas, director of the All Ohio Youth Choir since its beginning two years ago. Mr. Thomas toured Europe last year with his Zanesville High School Choir. He is scheduled to conduct the Lawrence County Music Festival this spring.

The students selected to take the tour of Europe will travel by Trans-World Airways jet from Kennedy International Airport, New York City, directly to Paris, France.

The choir will visit the his-return by Hydrafoil to Denmark, then fly to London for more concerts and sightseeing.

While in England, they will visit Wales, thence to Copenhagen, Denmark, touring the coast of Denmark, then by Hydrafoil (a boat on skis) to Sweden. From Sweden they will return by Hydramoil to Denmark, then fly to Hamburg, Germany, and to Berlin.

A four-hour tour of East Ger-

many is scheduled, crossing through the Berlin wall at Check-point Charlie. In Communist East Germany, they will visit the Russian War Memorial, and travel motorcade along the famed Unter Den Linden Boulevard via Potsdam, and the Brandenburg Gate to the River Spree. A visit to the French Sector, then back to West Berlin and fly from there to Zurich, Switzerland.

After touring and singing their way through the principal cities of Switzerland, they will fly to Milan, Italy, thence to Venice, and Florence for a tour of the world's most famous art galleries.

They will be guests at the Hotel Columbus in Rome where they will give an evening concert and tour the city before departing by plane for Spain, to Madrid and other points of interest.

An evening concert at Lisbon, Portugal and the next day the group will board a TWA jet for New York City.

5 School Districts Closed Due To Roads

Five inches of snow blanketed the area today forcing five county school districts plus two other rural schools to close and causing hazardous driving conditions throughout the region. The weatherman said a cold wave is scheduled to move into tri-state by late today, adding more misery and discomfort for residents.

Although snow fell most of

Monday, the white stuff didn't begin to stick until dusk. Early Monday evening driving conditions were very hazardous.

County School Supt. George Webb reported the heavy snowfall forced the following school districts to be closed today and most will be closed Wednesday, Symmes Valley, Decatur-Washington, Rock Hill, Dawson-Bryant and South Point. Mr. Webb said two schools in the Fairland District, Mount Vernon and Highland or Fairland Schools No. 2 and 3 are also closed. Glenn R. Webb, executive head of Dawson-Bryant District and Brady Willis, of South Point District, said schools in those districts will be open on Wednesday. Other schools are expected to remain closed.

John L. Fisher, superintendent of Chesapeake-Union School System, announced that all schools in that system are open today and will remain open on Wednesday.

The Weatherman has predicted colder temperatures for tonight. A low of ten degrees above zero are forecast for this area tonight. This morning's low reading was fifteen above zero. Slightly warmer weather is expected on Wednesday.

State, county and city crews were busy this morning clearing major highways and intersections. The Ohio State Highway Patrol said most major highways in the area will be clear by tonight but motorists are warned to travel with caution. All secondary roads are snow-covered and very slippery.

A storm churned northeastward through the Virginias today, dumping heavy snow in the Middle Atlantic States and leaving a 5 to 6-inch blanket of snow in Northern Kentucky.

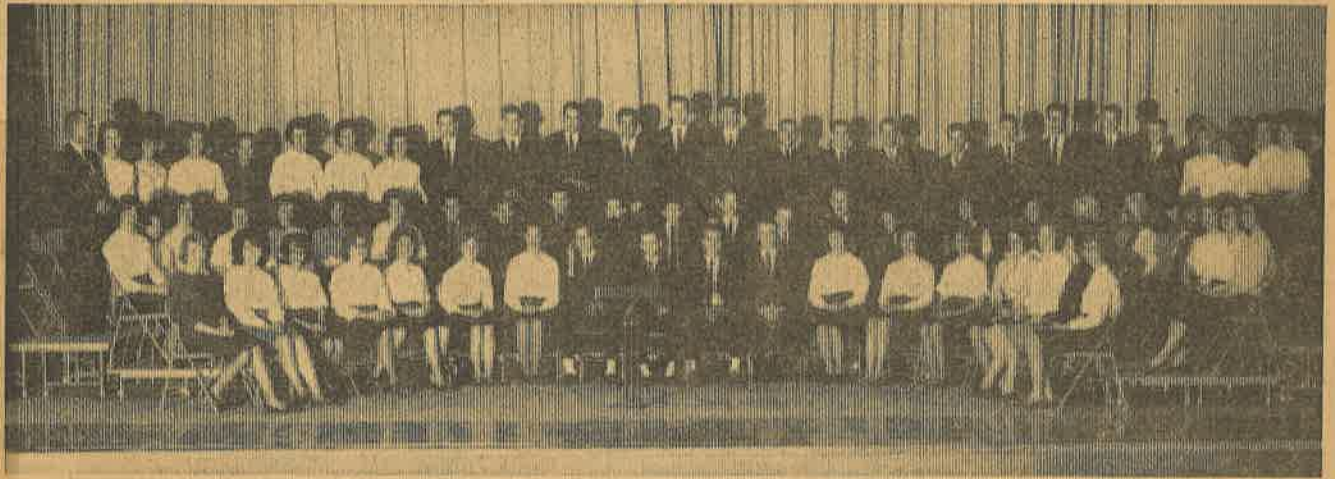

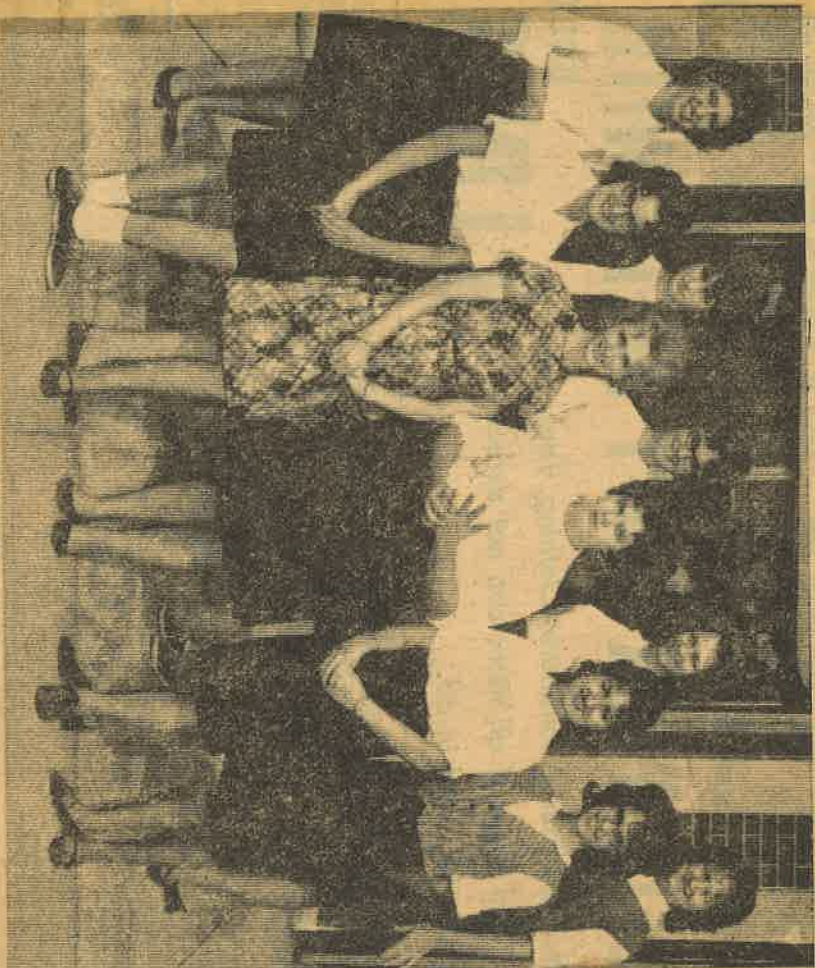

Coal Grove Formally Relinquishes Title

In a formal statement issued Thursday afternoon, Dawson-Bryant High School (Coal Grove) accepted the mandate of the Ohio High School Athletic Association that all games played this season by the Hornets be classified as forfeitures.

The Saint Joseph High School Flyers are acclaimed Ohio Valley Conference Champions as the result of the decision of the Association according to the rules of the Association.

Glenn R. Webb, executive head of Dawson-Bryant District Schools, James Dutey, athletic director and James Willis, D-B High School Principal, issued this statement to all schools participating in the Ohio Valley Conference:

"This statement is regarding Paul Eugene White, student and football team member at Dawson-Bryant High School.

"It has always been our policy to check carefully on the eligibility of those students participating in the sports program of this high school, not only the eligibility relating to age but scholarship as well.

"Our records, along with records on file in the Lawrence County Superintendent's Office indicate that Paul White entered this district from the Ironton City Schools in September 1959. He was first enrolled here in the seventh grade. At that time a parent statement indicated his date of

birth as March 12, 1945. This date was placed on his permanent record at that time. It has been our policy to use the school permanent record in determining the ages of students. In this case we had the school permanent record and the County School Office record. We also had a local physician's record indicating his age as eighteen years.

"Since there developed some question regarding Paul's eligible date of birth (March 12, 1945), we contacted the parent and explained that something

more than her statement was needed — that positive proof was necessary. The parent was unable to furnish any concrete information. The parent continued to maintain that his birth certificate was misplaced which showed 1945 as his year of birth. Feeling that the parent had been in error at the start (1959), we contacted the Lawrence County General Hospital and finally found a record of his date of birth. The certificate of birth as listed at the hospital indicates that Paul Eugene White was born March 11, 1944.

"This date, of course, does not agree with our records, substantiated by the mother's statement, nor the records in the office of the County Superintendent of Schools. Since our records were based on the integrity of a parent's statement, we feel we have acted in good faith.

"In any event we realize that the birth certificate would have priority over school records, parent statements, etc., and are prepared to abide by the Ohio High School Athletic Association's ruling in this matter.

"The foregoing was submitted to H. A. Meyer, assistant commissioner of the Ohio High School Athletic Association. He agrees that our actions in this matter have been in good faith. However, under the rules of the Ohio High School Athletic Association, all football games played by Dawson-Bryant High School this season are to be classified as forfeitures. Although this is a bitter pill to swallow on the part of Coal Grove players, students, and other loyal fans, we know the

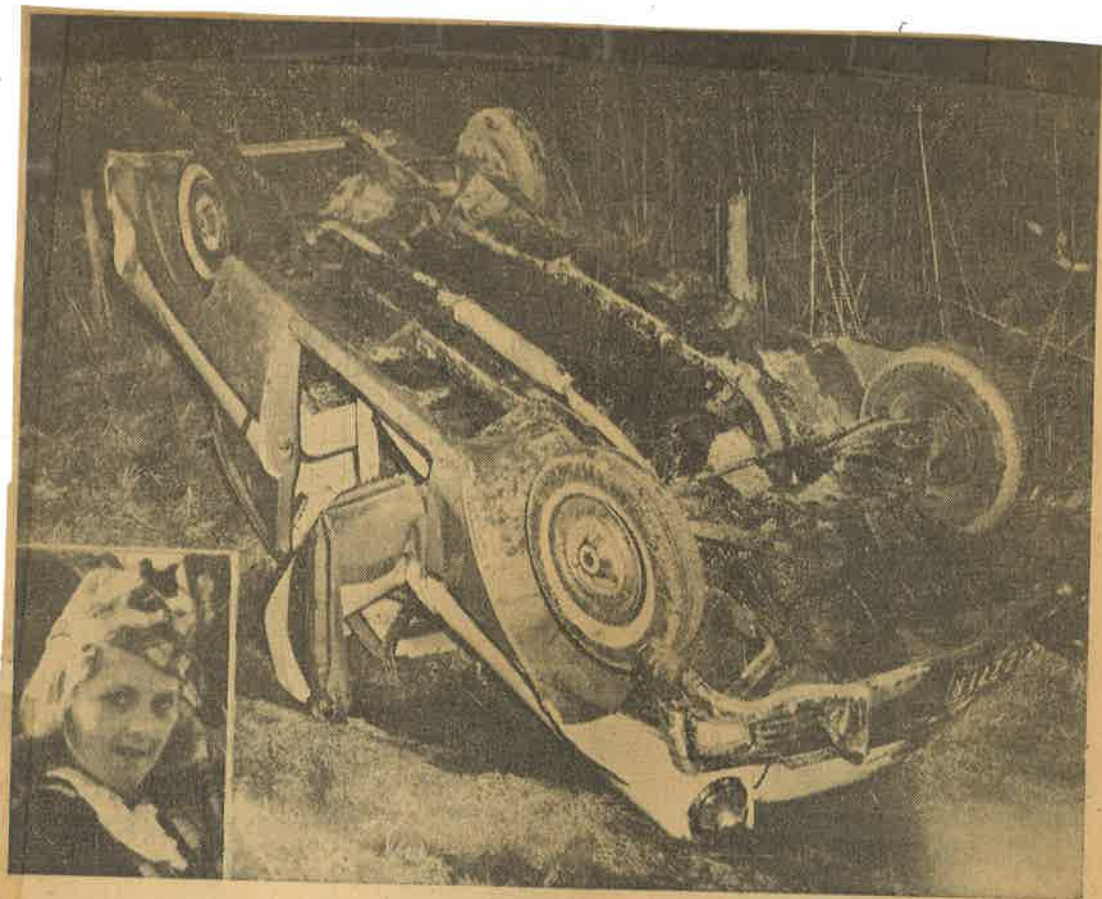

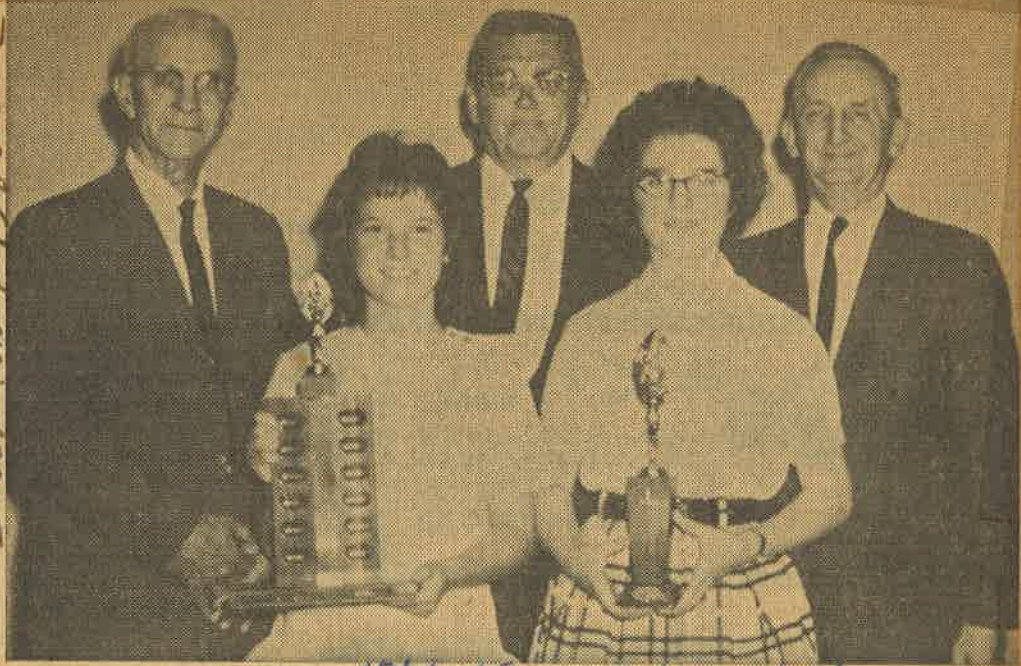

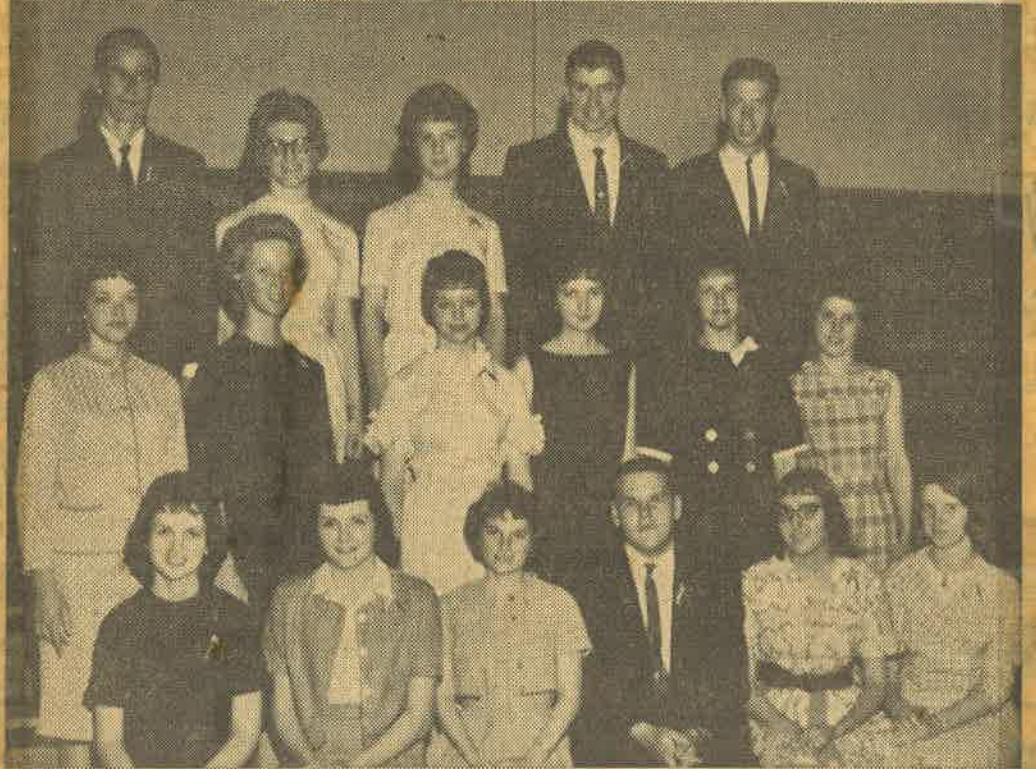
